The Bachelors program is the first-year, entry-level program for commissioners who have completed Basic Commissioner Training. The Masters and Doctorate program offer more advanced skills and problem solving experience, especially in the administrative area of unit service. The Doctoral program challenges the candidate to develop, organize, research and conduct an approved project that will impact the quality of unit service. An Advanced Studies curriculum is available for those commissioners who have a Masters or Doctorate Degree or who are unable to participate in the full schedule of classes for a degree. Degrees will be awarded only to registered commissioners and Service Team members.

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

BACHELORS COURSES

BCS 100 - PLENARY SESSION

<u>BCS 101</u> - INTRODUCTION TO COMMISSIONER SCIENCE. An overview of commissioner service and the single most important resource--*The Commissioner Field Book*.

<u>BCS 102</u> - UNIT CHARTER RENEWAL. Review a proven plan for reregistering Scouting units on time with minimal loss in membership and leaders. Learn the role of the commissioner to facilitate and achieve on-time charter renewal.

<u>BCS 103</u> - THE COMMISSIONER AND THE DISTRICT. Interaction of the commissioner with the district executive and district committee. Understanding district and council operation.

<u>**BCS 104**</u> - UNIT VISITATION. Provides participants with insights on effective unit visits, what to look for, and how to be a help -- not a hindrance.

<u>BCS 105</u> - PRACTICAL SOLUTIONS TO COMMON UNIT NEEDS. Helps commissioners understand how to respond to unit needs. Participants become familiar with Unit Commissioner Worksheets and *Commissioner Helps for Packs, Troops, and Posts*.

<u>BCS 106</u> - A COMMISSIONER'S PRIORITIES. Suggests the priorities for a unit commissioner's Scouting time and energy, reviews steps in handling unit problems, and covers the important Quality Unit Award.

<u>BCS 110</u> - COMMISSIONER STYLES. Presents important qualities of commissioner diplomacy, a concept of "exceptional service," thoughts about "roots and wings," service recover, and explains how to remove a volunteer

<u>BCS 112</u> - WHAT WOULD YOU DO? A group participation/discussion session on 10 fascinating situations that commissioners might encounter.

<u>BCS 117</u> - VENTURING BASICS. A view of the basics of the Venturing program covering structure, membership requirements, advancement, and an explanation of how this differs from a troop.

MASTERS COURSES

MCS300 - PLENARY SESSION

<u>MCS301</u> - No-Lapse/No-Drop Commitment. The group will explore why units lapse or drop and how to prevent it, how to develop a no-lapse/no-drop plan for a district, and why this is so important.

<u>MCS303</u> - COMMISSIONER LIFESAVING SKILLS. This session sets the stage for saving a unit and reviews the basic unit lifesaving steps.

<u>MCS306</u> - Counseling Skills. This session presents counseling as an effective method for commissioners to help units succeed. It covers many elements of good counseling.

<u>MCS307</u> - Transition fom Webelos to Boy Scout Covers important ways commissioners can help boys make the transition from a pack to a troop.

<u>MCS401</u> - JUST FOR ADCs. This session emphasizes the importance of the assistant district commissioner, his or her responsibilities, the effective ADC's people skills, and the evaluation of his or her work.

- <u>MCS 402</u> RECRUITING NEW COMMISSIONERS. This bread-and-butter session for all administrative commissioners covers all the steps of recruiting commissioners, group recruiting techniques, and sources of prospects.
- MCS 408 SELECTING & DEVELOPING A GROWTH PROJECT. This session covers the project outline and a variety of suggestions for writing and revising the report.
- MCS 417 VENTURING BEYOND THE BASICS. Why do some crews seem to struggle? What seems to make the difference? Are girls in a grew a god idea? Does your crew know how to make decisions? A look at these and other questions that Crew Advisors are struggling with.
